#### HARDINGTON WILDLIFE

I often make for the Hardington meadows when I'm in need of a nature fix. Sitting on Mike and Brenda's bench in the hazy afternoon sunshine, taking a few moments to soak up the view and enjoy the sounds of the natural world is something to be treasured. On a recent visit, a money spider set about exploring my phone case as I made a few notes, and three buzzards rode high on the thermals, mewing as they wheeled in lazy circles above me. A furious wren kicked up a fuss in the hedge beside me, alarmed by my presence perhaps, while an unconcerned wood pigeon was cooing five half-formed beats, its heart not really in it. I could just catch the coconut-scented gorse in the warming air, making me think of more tropical climes.

Blackthorn is bursting into blossom all over the place just now, as if to celebrate the long-anticipated arrival of Spring. It feels like it's been a particularly long wait this year! At least the primroses and daffodils don't seem to mind the rain - there are some gorgeous displays around the village and this joyous splash of Spring yellow does much to dispel the gloom on a muddy, grey day. Now that we've passed the Spring Equinox, we can leave the winter wet behind us and welcome the lighter evenings with renewed optimism!

Everywhere I go at the moment, bird song abounds. The soft peeping of bullfinches and the wheezy call of a greenfinch as I walk the lanes always makes me smile. It's lovely to have these handsome birds in evidence, especially as they are often the worst hit by disease. Siskins have made a welcome return to the garden, piling on to the feeders with cheerful enthusiasm. The males are the most noticeable, with their little black cap and bright yellow face and breast. Between them and the chattering goldfinches, they're a cheerful sight in the garden every day, although they've made a sizeable dent in our sunflower seeds!

One little garden visitor I was amazed to see out and about so early this year is the hummingbird hawkmoth, spotted on 5th March zipping around the front garden. I can only imagine it had over-wintered in the woodshed and was tempted out in the mild air. These fantastically energetic moths are migrants, most of whom fly into the UK from Southern Europe and North Africa, but occasionally, the adults will hibernate in unheated outbuildings through the winter months.

A final note: until at least the end of April, please don't forget to take extra care on the roads while the Toad Patrol are doing their good work. Nicola Maybury

THE CHURCH CLOCK: We have received many comments about the church clock not working and are amazed that so many people in our modern world still value it, because of its reliable timekeeping (which is thanks entirely to the skills of Simon Smith). The clock needs a new 'going train auto re-winder', which is currently in course of manufacture by our maintenance company, Cumbria Clock Company (CCC), at a cost of £3,786, a sum that we are trying to find through grants and other support – any donations from the village would be much appreciated. The existing re-winder has been in place for – we are told around 50 years, so it hasn't done too badly when one considers that most machinery has a life span of around 25 years. One interesting thing that has come to light as a result of the need for this work is the origin of the clock itself. CCC advise us that clocks were generally made by specialist clockmakers in major centres. We now know that our clock, whilst probably not unique, is likely to be one of only a few made locally in Yeovil by Hancock, Cox and Co. The company of Hancock, Clock and Watchmaker, existed in the late eighteenth century and was listed in a local directory in 1824. The accounts of St. John's Church in Yeovil show that Hancock's carried out the maintenance of their clock between 1837 and 1853, but the only information about them manufacturing timepieces seems to relate to pocket watches and long case clocks. CCC tell us that our clock was manufactured in about 1885 and this ties in with the fact that the company only existed as Hancock, Cox & Co. between 1872 and 1894. Hopefully the clock will be back in full working order before too long! Following an inspection and report by the Diocesan Bells Adviser, we also need to spend a substantial sum on the bells (expected to be around £10,000) and are currently obtaining quotations. Without this work, we may not be able to ring the bells at some point. Daphne Creed & Richard Middleton, Churchwardens.
