They are easily spotted so do try to avoid them and better still move them to a safe place preferably in the direction in which they were facing. Signs are now in place. Very importantly please be aware of people out on toad patrol. They should be easily seen with Hi Viz jackets, head torches and carrying buckets. She told us how she began training as a nurse in Poole at a time when matrons ruled the wards. After qualifying, Ally worked as a mental health nurse, first of all in psychiatric hospitals, before they were closed to allow for care in the community, then rose through the ranks to become a senior practitioner in both hospitals and the prison service. Ally stills works part-time in this field today where she continues to champion the rights of both patients and professionals. It was a funny and inspirational talk about a world unfamiliar to many of us.



THE PARISH CLERK WRITES... The February Meeting...

There were two planning applications discussed on the agenda this month. The first was for a replacement two-storey house at Orchard Cottage, Moor Lane. The new cottage will be further from the road. A resolution was passed to support the application. The second application was for the removal of two existing single-storey extensions, to be replaced by a two-storey extension (along with internal alterations) at Moor Farm, Moor Lane. The Parish Council also agreed to support this application.

There was also a 'Notification of Planning application only' from the Somerset Council, proposing a small rear extension at Olde Track, Hill End (this is notification only as the proposed extension falls within the thresholds that allow for larger home extensions).

A temporary road closure has been received for Lyatts Hill. The works are expected to commence on 11th March 2024 and last for 5 days to enable Wessex Water to install a new connection.

New footpath gates have been installed on footpath Y10/4 (Malcom's wood) to replace the existing damaged stiles.

An email has been received from Somerset Council stating that they are increasing the cost of the "Parish Ranger Scheme" from £23.79 per hour to £45.67 per hour (93% increase) due to increasing costs for the service. Several lower quoted rates have already been received for similar services and it was agreed the Clerk should follow these up.

The next scheduled Parish Council meeting will be at 7.30 in the Village Hall on the 19th March and the public can speak for a limited amount of time at the start.
